School Closure & Re-opening

The school was closed from the 23rd March to the 1st June. There were joint Workington hubs for the children of key workers and vulnerable pupils within Workington during all that time and schools took turns to staff them,

some of our staff being part of that. This school then opened over various phased intakes from the 1^{st} June building up to over 100 pupils. This however still resulted in $\frac{3}{4}$ of the pupils not being in school since March 23^{rd} .

To have such a long time out of school is unprecedented and is the first time such a long closure has happened since the introduction of universal education following the Education Act of 1870!! As a result this cohort of children are very special and indeed unique. It must have been very daunting for them to return to school, as for a large proportion of their young lives they were learning at home.

We have, as a school, been absolutely blown away with how well they have coped on their return. Their resilience, enthusiasm and zest for life at school has been a wonder to behold. A great deal of thanks goes to all our families for preparing them for this return and out attendance on the first day was 99.2% and the missing 3 children all were genuinely ill – astonishing and among the best if not the best school attendance on return nationally!

School Funds

Now we have the ParentPay system we can offer the facility for families to make an automatic School Fund donation on a monthly basis, from their bank account even £2 per month would cumulate to a great fund to support activities in school. If you would like to support the school in this way please contact the School office for further details on how to set this up or if you would rather for direct debit details.

Recent Changes

To ensure a smoother end to the day we have tweaked the collection arrangements to enable all parents to socially distance. This involves parents standing in particular areas against the sides of the school in EY and KS1 and Year 3 & 4 parents spreading around the fence line in the back yard. This has helped the efficiency of the end of the day routines but relies on all adults to wait in their specific areas and also to try their best to be socially distant. In addition there are new staggered start and end times are on the back page. These routines will continue to be tweaked so please do bear with us until we get a system that works as effectively as before the Covid guidelines. A reminder of timings are on the back page with the diary dates.

Since the initial opening letter you should have all received and that is still on our web site, we have also changed the instructions for PE Kit for Year 1 children and above to avoid families having to purchase additional tracksuit trousers or trainers. This initially caused some confusion. The definitive actions needed for PE are:

• Children to come to school on Fitness PPA days in tracksuits, trainers (we do not want to cause

additional expense for families at the moment so any will do) and a school PE top.

- On days where there is additional PE children can change into their shorts and pumps and wear their polo shirts.
- For after school sports they can do the same as above or bring PE Kit if it is outside.

Payment Changes

To minimise potential viral spread via cash please note the following:





In addition to milk payments being half termly we are asking for fruit money for those who want playtime fruit to be half termly as well. The cost will be £6 for the half term and should be paid in a labelled envelope.

- Early Years snack will also be half termly and costs £6
- Nursery children eligible for 30 hours will need to pay £1.50 a day towards lunch costs and need to pay for the lunches required in a week on a Monday, again in a labelled envelope.

Covid, Symptoms & Testing

Clearly with all that has happened there is a heightened level of concern about contracting Covid-19 and the need to test to prevent spread. The Government has asked all schools to pass on the message that testing is only needed and indeed available for anyone with one or more of the three identified symptoms. To summarise the current position:

A Primary pupil **WOULD** need to be treated as a suspected COVID-19 case (sent home, isolate along with household contacts and be tested) **ONLY** if they had one or more of the following symptoms:

- A high temperature (fever) of 37.8 degrees C or above
- A new continuous cough
- A loss of, or change to, their sense of taste or smell

Please note if you need a test for your child then the whole household has to self-isolate for 14 days or until a negative test result is returned.


Please also note the Government guidance goes on to state that:

A Primary pupil would **NOT** need to be treated as a suspected COVID-19 case if they had the following symptoms (as long as the three symptoms listed above were ABSENT)

- Sore throat
- Runny nose
- A cold and associated infrequent cough and sneeze
- Tummy ache, vomiting and diarrhoea (but they would be sent home immediately if D&V and they will be asked to stay at home until they were 48 hours clear of any gastro symptoms)
- Generally looking unwell

- Regular cough caused by a known trigger (e.g. damp weather causing a cough in a child with asthma)
- Headache

1. If a child/adult has been in school while a) showing symptoms or b) in school in the 48 hours before you will receive this text from school:

'Please be aware that there has been someone showing symptoms in your child's class/bubble. Symptoms to be aware of include new continuous cough, high temperature and/or loss of taste/smell'

If you receive this text you **DO NOT** need to keep your child off school and we **DO NOT** need to close any bubbles/classes. Your child is safe at school with us and we can assure you that we are taking every step to keep our school clean and secure for your children. It is just

supportive information so you can more closely monitor for any suspected symptoms.

2. If there is a positive case (positive test result) in your child's class/bubble.

We will inform **ALL** parents/carers that there has been a positive case (we will never give out any names or details as to who has tested positive). All close contacts (as described on page 6 in yellow tier 2) will have to self-isolate for 14 days or if symptoms develop they apply for a test. We will not contact or give any information out on Facebook. Only listen to advice received directly from school, either by phone call or text.



Contingency Plan & Remote Learning Offer

Under the school opening guidance from the Department for

Education it was incumbent on all schools to let parents know what their contingency plan and remote learning offer is. The above graphic forms part of the contingency plan. You will see that there may be occasions when children are sent home and at that point remote learning will resume. As a result there may be a situation where only a number of children are learning remotely when others are in school so the class teachers will have to blend the remote learning with their face to face teaching in school.

Our commitment to you is that we will again ensure your child has access to online learning resources and the school will maintain contact with you and your child. This initial guarantee clearly is dependent on families having access to internet enabled devices. We know of families that struggled with this during lockdown and were able to deliver 'paper based resources' to homes and will do so again (it is essential therefore we have up to date contact information).

In the meantime, to be prepared, if you have the financial ability, it may be wise to ensure you have a device that will facilitate such learning. We are aware that some may struggle with this, if your child has been told to self-isolate and is sent home from school please let the school know (in total confidence naturally) if this is something you would need help with. The Government have promised that there will be a limited supply of laptops with Wi-Fi dongles for families eligible for Free School Meals when their children are sent home to learn. This is not something that can be relied on however if you are eligible for free school meals and have not claimed it because your child has universal free infant meals it would be very wise to make a claim now.

APPLY NOW Details of how to claim free school meals can be found at or speak to the School Office who will help you with your claim. Indeed eligibility for Free Meals brings other benefits such as a uniform grant, free milk, free instrumental hire and also provides the school with additional funding. We urge that **ALL ELIGIBLE PARENTS OF PUPILS FROM RECEPTION UP TO YEAR 6** apply online through the Cumbria County Council 'Citizen Portal'. This can be found

Online Learning – Seesaw and Tapestry

In relation to all the above clearly all families will need access to Tapestry (which is for children in Nursery and Reception) and seesaw (for children in Y1 and above) and also for them to maintain their use of these online platforms so they become second nature.

ONLINE LEARNING

Tapestry is a great platform for Early Years parents to track their child's development and experiences in school and maintaining a dialogue between home and school.

Seesaw is a very similar platform and will become the main platform for homework for children in Year 1 upwards. As a result it should become embedded as a home school link and then be easily used if there are occasions when isolation requires home learning.

One of the most impressive things about how everyone coped with the lockdown was the speed at which these platforms were embraced by school staff and parents. Within a very short time frame there was a very steep learning curve at home and at school that resulted in these platforms being the bedrock of home learning. The fact learning continued during lockdown with a home/school link at a level just under 100% contrasted markedly with estimates of between 15% and 25% nationally is something the whole school community should be justifiably be proud of and would be very rare nationwide.

The Covid Future

TIER

The Government has stated that in any future actions the closing of Primary schools would be the last action taken. Even if there was a complete national lockdown as before Primary schools would remain open for children of critical workers and vulnerable pupils (as per the model in the second half of the Summer term).

This does not mean that there may be times when classes, year groups or wider 'Stage Bubbles' (i.e. Upper Key Stage 2 {Years 5 & 6}, Lower Key Stage 2 {Years 3 & 4}, Key Stage 1 {Years 1 & 2} and Early Years {Reception & Nursery}) will be sent home to isolate. Covid-19 Risk Assessments

In order to open to all pupils again in September the school had to formulate risk assessments to ensure Covid safety in the workplace for pupils and staff. We would like all our school community to be completely re-assured that all our risk assessments for September (as those for the June phased opening) were approved by the County's Corporate Health and Safety Department as well as being overseen by our Health & Safety Governor. Indeed, a great big 'Thank You' is due to our Health & Safety Governor, Mr Nick Whitehead (a parent...and lucky for us a H&S adviser at Sellafield) who has ensured all our actions are robust and safe. Of note is that he gave freely of his time for advice whilst on a family staycation this summer such is his commitment as a Governor committed to the safety of the school community.

The H&S documentation is a long read. The staff guidance booklet for opening ran to 60 pages...however if any of you would like to read this document then please book a time with the Office and we will share it for reading.

2020/21 School Testing

School testing resumes as normal in this academic year with national checks for Y1 phonics in June, Y2 & Y6 SATs in May, the Y4 times table tests in June and the EYFS Profile at the end of the school year (the planned Reception test



has been postponed until September 2021). The only change is that despite lockdown the Government want to test the Y1 children who missed their Phonics test in June this year. These children are now in Year 2 and will be tested after October half term and before Christmas. Those that don't pass will be retested with the Y1 children in June. The impact of lockdown on current Y2 children will not be taken into account and the test is based on the assumption schooling was as normal. For the wellbeing of these pupils it is important we try and support them in this and the Y2 teachers will have a phonics focus in the next few weeks in many of their homework activities.

Packed Lunches

The weakest point in all our Covid secure operations are packed lunches.

There are schools in Workington that have banned them but we have not gone done that route as yet however they are a major concern. If the school is striving to minimise what comes backwards and forwards to prevent any Covid spread then the question has to be are lunch boxes essential? Indeed we also cannot store them at refrigerated temperatures so other health issues come in to play.

They are also a concern as some children cannot open the sachets, pots or packets which is placing a dilemma on lunchtime staff as they feel the need to help children whereas their guidance says touching articles in these boxes can lead to cross contamination and they shouldn't do it.

It is really difficult in the new 'normal' to manage staggered lunchtimes, different halls, social distancing etc. without having pupils with lunchboxes that need to

be retrieved from classrooms whilst ensuring no pupil is out of sight of an adult for general H&S regulations. In addition, whilst asking packed lunch pupils to take their rubbish home, it is the tables they sit at that create the most mess by far and result in lunchtime staff having more to clear up when times are so tight. Finally the nutritional standards of a sizeable number of lunchboxes currently are very low, a study by Leeds University prior to lockdown found that only 1 in 100 Primary packed lunches met national nutritional standards. This generation of children, of any that have gone before, need to have a top notch nutritional diet to ensure healthy physical development for whatever the future will hold for them, the nutritional standards school meals have to meet are designed for them to meet this objective.

It is sometimes assumed that packed lunches are cheaper than school dinners. The cost for a week's school dinners is **£11** however the following costs are for items from Aldi for a week's worth of packed lunches:

Fruit – apples, grapes or carrots	£2.84

Savoury snack	£0.99
Filling – Ham, cheese or tuna	£2.97

Whilst strongly urging the uptake of school dinners where there are still families sending in packed lunches they MUST be healthy. There is a healthy snack swap chart below to give guidance on how packed lunches can be made healthier.





If you have been sending your child in with a packed lunch please consider the <u>nutritional benefit for</u> <u>your child and staff safety</u> and give school dinners another thought.

As a school the message can't be clearer:

Choose school meals! Nutritionally sound; school Covid safe and good value!

Please help the school at this challenging time by putting them on school dinners.

Finally, if your child is a faddy eater and you are concerned about their reaction to school dinners then do let us know. There are 3 different choices daily plus a sandwich option however if your child is struggling with food then please ring school and ask for Debbie and we will do our utmost to help your child and ensure they have a healthy lunch.

Personal Hand Sanitisers

For health & safety reasons please do not send your child to school with a personal hand sanitiser. We will ensure regular hand hygiene in school. Thank you.



Flu Vaccinations

All children in from Reception to Year 6 in England are eligible for seasonal flu vaccination during the autumn of 2020. It is particularly important all children get vaccinated this year so there is no confusion between flu and Covid symptoms and for health reasons as scientific research has shown that the body finds it hard to cope if trying to fight more than one viral infection at any one time.

It is a nasal spray vaccination and will not only help protect the children from getting flu but it also stops them spreading the disease to their family, carers and the wider population. As flu viruses change each year last year's immunisation for those that had it will not be effective.

The vaccination (Fluenz Tetra®) will be offered in school on **Thursday 1st October** for children in Reception and Key Stage 1 but sadly Key Stage 2 children will not receive theirs until **Wednesday 9th December** which is very late in the term. We have made protestations about this late date but to no avail. The vaccination is free and is a quick and simple spray up the nose. You should have received consent forms. **PLEASE ENSURE THESE ARE RETURNED TO SCHOOL.** The only children who will be excluded are those where there is contra-indicated medical advice and there are very few this will apply to across the country.

Parents of younger children may like to know that children aged 2 upwards and also in Nursery can receive their free vaccination through their GP or Pharmacies. Harrington Pharmacy offers this service and is very handy for school.

Flu vaccinations for adults are also available on request at Pharmacies or large supermarkets for an average £10 fee.

Term Time Holidays and the Law

The Government's policy of not allowing families to take holidays in term time and those that do being liable to prosecution and a fine <u>is still in operation.</u> We would like to ensure all families are aware of this law.



The Headteacher is not allowed to authorise absence and indeed any holiday absences in term time will be counted as 'unauthorised' (which equates to a truancy mark) and may be subject to a fixed penalty notice/fine.

Parents need to fill in a leave of absence form if their child is going to be missing from school (this is of vital importance as the school immediately chases up any unknown absences on the day itself and if the child's whereabouts is not known then the Police are notified – this is school policy). Parents can apply for 'exceptional circumstances' on this form if they so wish. It is imperative that school knows where your child is for safety reasons.



Term Time Holidays & Tests

There is active discouragement of taking holidays in term time as it disrupts a child's learning. <u>Taking</u> time off at the statutory testing

time needs to be avoided completely.

Safeguarding/Child Protection

If you ever have any concerns about the safety or well-being of a child, then you can ring your concerns through to the County's 24 hour 'Safeguarding Hub' number and you can remain anonymous if you wish. Callers can outline their concerns and the Safeguarding Hub will give advice (consultation) and if necessary undertake an assessment of need.



There is now also an adult NSPCC helpline where any concerned adult can seek advice if they are concerned about a child and would like advice on whether to make a referral. The number to call is



Domestic Violence

Debbie Cook, our Educational Support Manager has trained to



be a 'Domestic Violence Champion' and is a resource available to any adult who would like to confidentially share incidents with her and is a very good source of advice. Just contact the School Office to get in touch with her.

Domestic violence is on the increase and causes terrible harm to victims and the associated children.

It is everyone's responsibility to ensure it is eradicated. We are working closely with the Police and the school will learn of any incidents to support any children whose lives are affected by such an occurrence.

Contacting Police when a Child is Missing



To ensure the safety of your child the school has a policy whereby' after not receiving advanced notification of an absence and then not being able to contact the family, the child

will be reported as missing to the Police. This procedure is aimed at ensuring that a situation where the family think the child is at school and the school thinks the child is with the family does not arise as this would then result in a child being missing until midafternoon! Failure to notify the school has only happened rarely but causes unnecessary upset when it does. To avoid police involvement please could all families ensure the school knows the whereabouts of your child in term times by ringing school on the day of absence or completing a leave of absence form in advance. There are leave of absence forms available from the School Office.

School Glossary

For new parents the following are terms you may see in this or other newsletters with their explanations!



Nursery age – Children are entitled to a 'free' 15 hours a week Nursery place starting from the term after their 3rd birthday. Depending on when a child is born they could spend up to 5 terms in the Nursery. Children are able to access our Educare service immediately on or after their 3rd birthday.

Educare – This is a service which is offered by the school for parents of children in the Nursery. Educare provides further Nursery provision up to the full school day. This can be purchased or accessed through the new additional FREE scheme set up by the Government. Parents need a registration code for Further details are available from the School Office. Alternatively Educare is also available at a very competitive cost, please see the costings listing on the previous page. Child care vouchers from employers are also welcomed.

Reception – This is the school year after Nursery and before Year 1, the year in which a child has their 5th birthday.

Foundation Stage – This is the first phase in a child's educational career and comprises of the Nursery and Reception years. The phase ends with an assessment on your child's attainment over a number of early learning strands which are reported in the end of Reception report.

Key Stage 1 (KS1) – This is school Years 1 & 2. There is a nationally standardised test in phonics at the end of Year 1 (repeated in Year 2 if a child doesn't pass first time) and nationally standardised and locally moderated learning outcomes at the end of Year 2.

Year 1 Phonics Screening Check – This is a specific check on the progress of children in Year 1 in learning how to read. It is called the Year 1 Phonics Screening Check. The check is a list of 40 words that children read one-to-one with the teacher. Some of the words are real words that are likely to be known to the children. Some of the words are non-words which are aimed at helping test whether children are using only their knowledge of letter sounds to build up what the word says (and not other clues). Support for phonics and further information is available in the parent information zone of our web site.

Key Stage 2 (KS2) – This is school Years 3, 4, 5 & 6. There are ongoing summative assessments throughout these years and at the end of every year. At the end of year 6 the children are nationally tested (known as the SATs);

- In English there will be a national test in reading plus spelling, grammar and with writing being teacher assessed.
- In Maths (3 papers, one on arithmetic and 2 on mathematical reasoning) and on occasion

- Science (which is a national sample test)

SATs These take place at the end of Year 2 and Year 6. Results will be reported in the form of raw scores which is the sum of the marks awarded in the test and scaled scores where national data is analysed and the average raw score is awarded '100' which becomes the national average. Other raw scores are then scaled to give a number above or below this to compare outcomes with national averages. In addition the end of year report in these years will show whether or not your child has achieved the nationally expected standard i.e. the outcome as predetermined by the Government for a 7 year or an 11 year old child. There is a lot of information about assessments and samples of end of year tests in the Revision zone of the web site. You will need to use the username: **bps** and the password **home**.

Across the school your child will be assessed formatively i.e. as they go along to pinpoint future progress needs. Their assessment levels and progress will be communicated to you each term through the report and parents' meetings.

Homework

Homework

The school's Homework Policy can be read in full on our web site in the Policies section or is available in our carousel of policies in the school entrance.

The following are 2 sections that explain some key facets of homework set at the school:

Our routines

All classes give out weekly homework on a Friday. it is expected to be completed by the following Wednesday or Thursday depending on the Year group.

The work should always have been explained and discussed in class before coming home; it maybe a continuation of classwork, or a maths game already familiar to your child.

It is our intention, and good practice, not to send work home that the child cannot already do i.e. parents are not expected to teach new skills.

There should be a clear explanation/reminder from the teacher of what is expected.

Each child has a homework book or folder and the majority of tasks are kept in there. Work that needs marking (and is not feeding into other classwork) will be returned to the folder. This should happen each week.

The tasks set will not always need to be handed in; there are other ways in which teachers will respond or give feedback, for example, sharing results in class discussion, putting work on to a display or transferring work into class books.

Our current expectations

Nursery

Parents are encouraged to read a variety of books to their children and to change their reading books daily. They are also encouraged to use everyday situations for counting and communication with their children.

Parents are regularly given information about the work being covered and offered ideas about how to develop them at home. Parents are also given skills based targets on reports and provided with information on how to help prepare their child for full time school.

Reception

Reading books and tricky words are taken home daily and letters and sounds are regularly sent home for children to practise. Parents are given skills based targets and are encouraged to learn rhymes and play counting games with their children.

KS1

Reading books and Reading Records should be taken home daily. Our 'Strive for Five Raffle' is currently suspended but will re-start as soon as guidance allows. Weekly Friday homework will consist of one piece of basic skills maths practice and a reading comprehension. Learning Challenge homework may be given over longer holidays. Y2 children may work on specific spellings in order to prepare for SATs.

KS2

Reading books and Reading Records should be taken home daily. Accelerated Reader is used by the children in Years 3 & 4 to ensure their comprehension is secure. Weekly Friday homework will consist of one piece of maths – focusing on calculation or times tables and a reading comprehension. Learning Challenge homework may be given over longer holidays. As children prepare for SATs in KS2, homework will focus on preparing children for the demands of these tests and the format of questions.

We expect children to maintain the same standards for presentation of homework as we set in school i.e. to use their best handwriting and a sharp pencil or blue pen.

One constant homework is to read (or

be read to) for at least 20 minutes a day. We would urge every parent to ensure this happens. As explained above we need parents to check the understanding of the text they have read by asking pertinent questions



about it. Below are some ideas to ensure this time is a useful learning experience – READING is the key to all learning and it is the main thing that parents can really do to support their child (ren) with their school work.

- Reading together sharing books and stories should be an enjoyable experience for you both. Choose a time that is suitable for both parent and child and choose books that appeal to the child.
- Praise and encouragement are the most important words to remember. Make praise specific where possible.
- Talking about books, authors, pictures, stories and characters is every bit as important as 'de-coding'. Take time to introduce the book before reading and ask questions about it afterwards e.g. 'How do you think Lucy felt when.....?'
- The initial (first) letter sound of a word is often a good clue to an unfamiliar word. Take care when asking children to sound out the letters in a word as they may not be successful.
- Encourage children to use the meaning of what they have read to guess an unknown word.
- When your child gets stuck get them to read from the beginning of the sentence again to have another try or skip the word, go to the end of the sentence and come back for another try.
- **W** Have regular checks for **understanding**.
- Try to avoid too many interruptions. If the child says a different word to the printed word but it still makes sense then let them carry on and come back to it at the end of the page or paragraph.

- If the child is making too many errors they may need a different book. As a rough guide, if the child is making about 1 error in every 10 words then the book is probably too hard.
- Read to the child even when they can read for themselves, they benefit from hearing stories well-read and talking about them.
- Try reading alternate pages to add interest and to pick up the pace.
- Make it easy for children to practise reading take them to the library, buy them books of their own, swap comics and magazines with friends and look at the printed word all around e.g. posters on car journeys.
- Let them see you reading sometimes...& enjoying it!

There is also a lot of information to help your child with reading in the 'Help Your Child to Read' zone on our web site.



<u>Jewellery</u>

The only jewellery items allowed in school are watches and stud ear-rings which have to be removed for PE/Sport. If your child cannot remove their ear-rings as they have been recently pierced then please provide plasters to cover them up. There have been many instances of injury nationally from wearing jewellery whilst undertaking sporting activity.

Loom bands can be brought in to weave at play and lunchtimes but can only be worn on non-uniform days.



QR Codes




Shopping Gateway

We aim to improve the health and fitness of our youngsters and reduce congestion and the hazard of

traffic outside school. In addition to the above please be careful with cars around all school exit routes. The zig zags on Church Road should be free from cars at all start and end times of school to enable clear areas for children to cross. Again we ask all who collect in cars NOT to park on the zig zags.

Finally please do take time to thank the road

crossing officer, Mary, who does a great job helping the children to cross safely, sometimes in difficult circumstances.

Looking Out for the Children

Assessment, Reports & Parents' Evenings

We are finalising details of parents' meetings/contacts

for this term. The focus will be on pupil wellbeing and settling back in to routines. We are looking into these sessions being either face to face, or by phone or by Zoom. Further details will be in next month's newsletter.

Classroom staff are continually assessing the children formatively over this term and planning various strategies to plug gaps in learning, accelerate progress and set up interventions to support children's learning. Our pupils are in a much better position than many nationally as there was ongoing online school work taking place in the majority of households which has aided their academic development.

The children will then be formally academically assessed early in the Spring term and there will be a meeting to analyse progress. The school will be continuing with the report format similar to last year with changes to reflect reviews in its effectiveness and developments in our internal assessment system. You will receive detailed information on your child's targets and progress towards them as well as **R**ed, **A**mber or **G**reen ratings for many other areas of their school life. You can support their targets by, for example, ensuring they are punctual or a<u>lways have their P.E. Kit.</u> There will be a further formal assessment in the Summer term which will inform the end of year report you will receive. If you wish to discuss any issues with your child's class teacher in the meantime then please contact school and the teacher



will be happy to ring you back at a mutually convenient time.


