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2021-22 Procedures & Organisation

Please can all parents note the following:



Start of the Day

• The school opens to all year groups at 8.50am daily. Please can all parents ensure their child(ren) is

punctual. The start of the day procedures will be the same as the end of last term including hand washing however face masks are no longer required but are optional. EY & KS1 to line up the hill and KS2 to line up at the back.

 If your child is unable to attend school then school must be notified before the start of the day. Registers are checked and families contacted if there is an unexplained absence.
 If no response from families is forthcoming then the Police will be contacted.

School Uniform

All children MUST be in school uniform. Full details about our uniform are on our web site but in a nutshell

The uniform consists of:

- School sweat shirt*, school fleece*, school T shirt*, polo shirt* or white shirt
- Grey or black tailored trousers or knee length skirts
 - (not sports trousers/tracksuit trousers)
- Dark deck shorts or blue gingham or pinafore dresses
- Low heeled footwear, shoes or trainers.
 These need to be black with no promotional logos.













Please note that only natural hair colours are allowed and the only jewellery allowed are stud ear-rings (which have to be covered for PE) and watches.

Food & Drink



- School meals cost £12 per week or £2.40 a day payable on ParentPay
- Milk is vital for growing children as it strengthens bones and teeth. Children in Reception and Nursery are entitled to free milk as are children who are eligible for free school meals and clothing vouchers (not the universal free meal for all FS & KS1 children).
 The cost of milk for this half term

is £10.00 and needs to be paid by Friday, 10th September via ParentPay NOT cash or cheque. If you need help with this please see the School Office. Due to the administrative burden of checking attendance and the inability to change the order daily unfortunately milk money cannot be refunded for absence.




- Snack money for Nursery and Reception is also paid by ParentPay and is due by the same Friday, 10th September, the cost is £8
- Fruit tuck shop money from Year 1 up is also paid this way, £8 for the first half term by Friday 10th September

PE Days

The system of coming to school in PE Kits as part of Covid safety measures worked well and save lots of lesson time so maximising exercise. We are going to trial this system into this year. They MUST wear a school uniform sweatshirt or cardigan on top unless it is a non-uniform day. Your child will need plimsolls that can be left in their locker.



Please can all packed lunch families note we follow the guidance set by the Children's Food Trust. We have noted there are items in some bait boxes that do not comply. Please can you ensure this does not happen as your child will not be able to consume such food for their lunch.

Food and drink in packed lunches: what the policy states

- The school will provide appropriate and attractive facilities for pupils eating packed lunches and ensure that free, fresh drinking water is available at all times.
- The school will work with parents to encourage packed lunches to meet the standards listed below.
- As fridge space is not available, pupils are advised to bring packed lunches in insulated bags with freezer blocks where possible.
- Wherever possible the school will enable pupils eating packed lunches and pupils eating school lunches to sit together.

Packed lunches should include:

- at least one portion of fruit and one portion of vegetables every day.
- mest, fish, eggs, or a non-dairy protein (e.g. lentils, kidney beans, chickpess, houmous, peanut butter, falafel) every day.
- è oily fish, such as salmon, at least once every three weeks.
- a starchy food such as any type of bread (white or wholegrain rolls, pitta bread or wraps), pasta, rice, couscous, noodles, potatoes or another cereal every day.
- a dairy food such as milk, cheese, yoghurt, fromage frais or custard every day.
- a drink of water, fruit juice or smoothie (maximum portion 150 mls), semi-skimmed, 1% fat or skimmed milk, yoghurt or another milk drink.

Packed lunches should NOT include:

- è salty snacks such as crisps instead include nuts, seeds, vegetables and fruit with no added salt, sugar or fat.
- i confectionery such as chocolate bars, chocolate-coated biscuits, cereal bars, processed fruit bars and sweets
- sugary soft drinks, such as squash and fizzy drinks (even if labelled as 'sugar-free', 'no-added sugar' or 'reduced sugar' as these drinks
 can contribute to tooth decay and provide little nutritional value).

School Lunches - BEST choice



Taking school dinners is the option the school would favour you to do. The meals are good quality, are stringently checked against nutritional guidelines and the children get 5 (!) choices of main

course daily so there should always be something your child would like (a hot meal of the day, a vegetarian choice, a sandwich choice, a pasta choice or a baked potato choice). The Children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 receive free meals, the cost for a child in KS2 is £2.40 per day or £12 for the week and for Nursery children it is £1.70 a day or £8.50 a week.

The menus for this term are displayed on page 6 and further information and FAQs on page 7 & 8.

If you are entitled to free school meals then please claim them even if your child receives a free infant meal. The school receives additional funding for every free school meal child and families also receive money towards school free school meals and clothing vouchers are available for your child(ren) if you receive one of the following qualifying benefits:

- Income Support (IS)
- Income Based Jobseekers Allowance (IBJSA)
- An income related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Child Tax Credit, provided you are not entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual income (as assessed by Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs) that as of April 2012 does not exceed £16,190. Note: From 1st May 2009 where you are entitled to Working

Tax Credit during the four week period immediately after your employment ceases, or after you start to

- work less than 16 hours per week, your children are entitled to Free School Meals, this may be extended
- The Guarantee element of State Pension Credit
- Universal Credit



FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What are the School Food Standards?

The School Food Standards were developed by government and are a set of food-based standards to ensure menus are nutritious, balanced and healthy. Examples include offering wholemeal starchy foods, having oily fish on the menu, and limiting pastry. Find out more: www.schoolfoodplan.com

How much sugar are in your desserts?

In line with recommendations to reduce free sugars (free sugars are added sugars – those not naturally found in fruit or milk) and the Children's Food Trust guidance, Caterlink have reduced the sugar content of all desserts to under 6.5g of free sugars per portion. Across our menus the average sugar content per day is 4.5g of free sugars, so you can be sure your child is getting healthy desserts.

Is my child getting enough food?

All recipes are created in line with the School Food Standards recommended portion sizes and are checked by a nutritionist. As well as the main meal, vegetables and dessert, we also offer bread and salad daily for the children to take.

What is MSC fish?

By choosing fish with a Marine Stewardship Council blue label, we can ensure that we are supporting sustainable fisheries and protecting the ocean. All fish on our menu is MSC certified.

What is red tractor meat?

Red tractor ensures that we can trust that all of the meat that we buy and know that it has to meet strict standards such as animal welfare, traceability, food safety and environmental protection. We have a British First Policy and all of our meat products are traceable from farm to fork.

How much salt is in your food?

We work with suppliers to ensure products are in line with the Government Salt Targets. We also don't add salt to our recipes as per the School Food Standards.

What is the Food for Life Served Here award?

Food for Life Served Here is a set of criteria ensuring that food served is healthy, local, seasonal and fresh. We operate all of our schools on their silver standards as a minimum. We were the first education caterer to be awarded the Food For Life award. Find out more: www.foodforlife.org.uk

What are Added Plant Power dishes?

Added plant power dishes are recipes where the protein comes from a mixture of meat and plant-based proteins such as beans, chickpeas, or lentils, such as a chilli con carne with kidney beans in. This makes the dishes more environmentally friendly (a 50% reduction in greenhouse gases), whilst reducing saturated fat content and increasing fibre.

Plasters


If your child is allergic to plasters then please do let the School Office know. Plasters are effective in controlling bleeding and securing wounds from infection and they will be used for minor cuts and grazes unless you have let us know otherwise.

Medicines

The school will administer medicine <u>only</u> when it is **4** times a day and has an <u>appropriate prescription sticker</u>. We will disinfectant wipe the bottles.



Please note that cough medicines/lozenges etc., <u>are not allowed unless they have been prescribed</u>. If you wish the school to administer medicine then you will need to complete a form available from the School Office.



School Glossary

For new parents the following are terms you may see in this or other newsletters with their explanations!



Nursery age – Children are entitled

to a 'free' 15 hours a week Nursery place starting from the term after their 3rd birthday. Depending on when a child is born they could spend up to 5 terms in the Nursery. Children are able to access our Educare service immediately on or after their 3rd birthday. **Educare** – This is a service which is offered by the school for parents of children in the Nursery. Educare provides further Nursery provision up to the full school day. This can be purchased or accessed through the FREE 30 hours scheme set up by the Government. Parents need a registration code. Further details are available from the School Office. Alternatively Educare is also available at a very competitive cost, please see the costings listing on the previous page. Child care vouchers from employers are also welcomed.

Reception – This is the school year after Nursery and before Year 1, the year in which a child has their 5th birthday.

Foundation Stage or Early Years – This is the first phase in a child's educational career and comprises of the Nursery and Reception years. Children in Reception will undergo a **Baseline Assessment** early in September which is a national assessment.

Key Stage 1 (KS1) – This is school Years 1 & 2. There is a nationally standardised test in phonics at the end of Year 1 (repeated in Year 2 if a child doesn't pass first time) and nationally standardised and locally moderated learning outcomes at the end of Year 2.

Year 1 Phonics Screening Check – This is a specific check on the progress of children in Year 1 in learning how to read. It is called the Year 1 Phonics Screening Check. The check is a list of 40 words that children read one-to-one with the teacher. Some of the words are real words that are likely to be known to the children. Some of the words are non-words which are aimed at helping test whether children are using only their knowledge of letter sounds to build up what the word says (and not other clues). Support for phonics and further information is available in the parent information zone of our web site.

This will take place in the week beginning the 6th June 2022.

Key Stage 2 (KS2) – This is school Years 3, 4, 5 & 6. There are ongoing summative assessments throughout these years and at the end of every year. At the end of year 6 the children are nationally tested (known as the SATs);

- In English there will be a national test in reading plus spelling, grammar and with writing being teacher assessed.
- In Maths (3 papers, one on arithmetic and 2 on mathematical reasoning) and on occasion
- Science (which is a national sample test)

On occasions KS2 may be subdivided into LKS2 – Lower Key Stage 2 or Years 3 & 4 and UKS2 – Upper key Stage 2 or Years 5 & 6.

SATs These take place at the end of Year 2 and Year 6. Results will be reported in the form of **raw scores** which is the sum of the marks awarded in the test and **scaled scores** where national data is analysed and the average raw score is awarded '100' which becomes the national average. Other raw scores are then scaled to give a

number above or below this to compare outcomes with national averages. In addition the end of year report in these years will show whether or not your child has achieved the **nationally expected standard** i.e. the outcome as pre-determined by the Government for a 7 year or an 11 year old child. There is a lot of information about assessments and samples of end of year tests in the Revision zone of the web site. You will need to use the username: **bps** and the password **home**.

The SAT test week for this school year is the week beginning the 9th May 2022.

Across the school your child will be assessed formatively i.e. as they go along to pinpoint future progress needs. Their assessment levels and progress will be communicated to you each term through the report and parents' meetings.

Year 4 Times Table Check This will take place in a 3 week window from the 6th June 2022. All children in year 4 will undergo a national times table speed challenge check. Please do help your children learn their times tables up to 12x12 off by heart.



Y6 Graduation

To reduce the risk of isolation our Y6 classes were split into 4 towards the end of the term.



The vast majority made it to the last day (there were a couple who sadly had to self-isolate from cases

outside school). The Y6 children performed an amazing and professional

performance of Macbeth, had their graduation ceremony and were clapped down the hill on the last afternoon. We wish them all every success as they move on to their Secondary phase of their education.




Social Media

The school had to sort out all sorts of issues that spilled over from the use of social media by children out of school. Some of the issues were completely age inappropriate and there is a real concern that early use of social media is robbing children of their childhood and indeed innocence.

The Governors have set up a working party to try to look at actions that can be taken to highlight the importance of children not accessing these sites.

Social media sites have a legal MINIMUM age for a reason, children's brains are not mature enough to understand texts out of context or share things that are inappropriate. Whatever they post could haunt them for their rest of their lives. See the minimum ages here;



We strongly urge you not to let your children use these sites.

There is a parental guidance video presented by our own Ms Gorman on our web site which is well worth a watch. It is in the 'Parent Info' zone or follow the QR code.




Please protect their childhood and innocence. Please blame the school and if they say "Everyone is on them" then that is certainly not true!

Homework

The school's Homework Policy can be read in full



on our web site.

The following are 2 sections that explain some key facets of homework set at the school:

Our routines

All classes give out weekly homework on a Friday. It is expected to be completed by the following Wednesday or Thursday depending on the Year group.

The work should always have been explained and discussed in class before coming home; it maybe a continuation of classwork, or a maths game already familiar to your child. There should be a clear explanation/reminder from the teacher of what is expected.

All homework is now set on our learning platforms, Tapestry for Nursery and Reception and Seesaw for Y1 upwards.

Our current expectations

Nursery

Parents are encouraged to read a variety of books to their children and to change their reading books regularly. They are also encouraged to use everyday situations for counting and communication with their children.

Parents are regularly given information about the work being covered and offered ideas about how to develop them at home.

Reception

Reading books and tricky words are taken home daily regularly sent home for children to practise. Homework is set on a Wednesday on tapestry for completion by the following Tuesday. Parents are encouraged to learn rhymes and play counting games with their children and refer to their 'next steps' on Tapestry.

KS1

Reading books and Reading Records should be taken home daily. Weekly Friday homework will be set on Seesaw and will consist of one piece of basic skills maths practice and Reading Comprehension/English activity comprehension. Learning Challenge homework may be given over longer holidays. Y2 children may work on specific spellings in order to prepare for SATs and Y1 will start spellings in the Spring term.

KS2

Reading books and Reading Records should be taken home regularly. Reading Plus is used by the children to ensure their comprehension is secure. Weekly Friday homework will be set on Seesaw and will consist of one piece of maths — focusing on calculation or times tables, spellings and a reading comprehension. Learning Challenge homework may be given over longer holidays. As children prepare for SATs in KS2, homework will focus on preparing children for the demands of these tests and the format of questions.

One constant homework is to read (or be read to) for at least 20 minutes a day. We would urge every parent to ensure this happens. As explained above we need parents to check the understanding of the text they have read by asking pertinent questions



about it. Below are some ideas to ensure this time is a useful learning experience – READING is the key to all




learning and it is the main thing that parents can really do to support their child (ren) with their school work.

- Reading together sharing books and stories should be an enjoyable experience for you both. Choose a time that is suitable for both parent and child and choose books that appeal to the child.
- Praise and encouragement are the most important words to remember. Make praise specific where possible.
- Talking about books, authors, pictures, stories and characters is every bit as important as 'de-coding'. Take time to introduce the book before reading and ask questions about it afterwards e.g. 'How do you think Lucy felt when.....?'
- The initial (first) letter sound of a word is often a good clue to an unfamiliar word. Take care when asking children to sound out the letters in a word as they may not be successful.
- Encourage children to use the meaning of what they have read to guess an unknown word.
- When your child gets stuck get them to read from the beginning of the sentence again to have another try or skip the word, go to the end of the sentence and come back for another try.
- Have regular checks for understanding.
- Try to avoid too many interruptions. If the child says a different word to the printed word but it still makes sense then let them carry on and come back to it at the end of the page or paragraph.
- If the child is making too many errors they may need a different book. As a rough guide, if the child is making about 1 error in every 10 words then the book is probably too hard.
- Read to the child even when they can read for themselves, they benefit from hearing stories well-read and talking about them.
- Try reading alternate pages to add interest and to pick up the pace.
- Make it easy for children to practise reading take them to the library, buy them books of their own, swap comics and magazines with friends and look at the printed word all around e.g. posters on car journeys.
- Let them see you reading sometimes...& enjoying it!

There is also a lot of information to help your child with reading in the 'Help Your Child to Read' zone on our web site.

Finally, as a reward for those reading at least 5 times a week at home they become eligible to be

Latest Covid Update

What are the Symptoms of Covid?

Lateral flow tests are available for asympotamitic testing for yourselves or other adult family members, these are not advised for Primary aged children. These are available by post from Gov.uk, some pharmacies or from Allerdale house.

If you suspect you or any member of your family **including children** have Covid then you should go for a PCR test.

Arranging a Test

Testing can be arranged via the national portal: https://www.gov.uk/get-coronavirus-test

If you have symptoms, you and everyone you live with must immediately self-isolate.

Do not leave home until you get your test results.

Flu Vaccine

To help in the identification of any possible symptoms of Covid we have arranged for our flu vaccination programme to be relatively early in the school year. Flu vaccinations will take place at school on Wednesday 20th October for all years from Reception upwards. It is particularly important all children get vaccinated this year so there is no confusion between flu and Covid symptoms and for health reasons as scientific research has shown that the body finds it hard to cope if trying to fight more than one viral infection at any one time.



It is a nasal spray vaccination ((Fluenz Tetra®)) and will not only help protect the children from getting flu but it also stops them spreading the disease to their family, carers and the wider population. As flu viruses change

each year last year's immunisation for those that had it will not be effective.

The vaccination is a nasal spray and is not painful. The school pupils have been brilliant at receiving it in recent years.

You will receive consent forms. PLEASE ENSURE THESE ARE RETURNED TO SCHOOL. The only children who will be excluded are those where there is contra-indicated medical advice and there are very few this will apply to across the country.

Parents of younger children may like to know that children aged 2 upwards and also in Nursery can receive their free vaccination through their GP or Pharmacies. Harrington Pharmacy offers this service and is very handy for school.

Flu vaccinations for adults are also available on request at Pharmacies or large supermarkets for an average £10 fee.

Term Time Holidays and the Law

The Government's policy of not allowing families to take holidays in term time and those that do being liable to prosecution and a fine is still in operation. We would like to ensure all families are aware of this law.



The Headteacher is not allowed to authorise absence and indeed any holiday absences in term time will be counted as 'unauthorised' (which equates to a truancy mark) and may be subject to a fixed penalty notice/fine.

Parents need to fill in a leave of absence form if their child is going to be missing from school (this is of vital importance as the school immediately chases up any unknown absences on the day itself and if the child's whereabouts is not known then the Police are notified this is school policy). Parents can apply for 'exceptional circumstances' on this form if they so wish. It is imperative that school knows where your child is for safety reasons.



Term Time Holidays & Tests

There is active discouragement of taking holidays in term time as it disrupts a child's learning - see

article above and the letter from County in the July newsletter. Taking time off at the statutory testing time needs to be avoided completely.

6JM: Week beginning 15th November

Children will need a bag, a towel, appropriate swimwear and a hair brush or comb. Time is tight and the children will not have time for any 'beauty' treatments before returning to school on the bus!

Please can all note that <u>swimming is statutory and all should take part unless medical advice states otherwise.</u> There is no better sport for overall health than swimming. It's great for your heart and circulation, provides natural, low-impact resistance for building muscle and as it challenges your body it will help release endorphins - your body's natural pain and stress fighters which can fight off infection and also make you feel happy.

In relation to the above and to help with next year's team (!) we would encourage you to explore the possibility of enrolling your child in Workington Swimming Club if your child enjoys swimming.

Swimming is a very enjoyable sport and is a very effective way of getting and keeping fit at any age. The non-uniform day in October is on the 15th October to support anti-racist charities


Walk to School

If you ever have any concerns about the safety or wellbeing of a child, then you can ring your concerns through to the County's 24 hour 'Safeguarding Hub' number and you can remain anonymous if you wish. Callers can outline their concerns and the Safeguarding Hub will give advice (consultation) and if necessary undertake an assessment of need.



There is now also an adult NSPCC helpline where any concerned adult can seek advice if they are concerned about a child and would like advice on whether to make a referral. The number to call is

Beckstone Xtra (again £3.50 an hour) runs from the end of the school day until 5.15pm with an earlier pick up time of 4.15pm if required.



Due to the number isolating we decided to postpone Bingo at the end of term. This will now take place on Thursday 21st October



Kidsafe


