#### **Mobile Phone Policy**

The school has had an agreed policy on mobile phones for many years. The policy has been that children **should NOT** be bringing phones into school unless it is for an unavoidable reason. The reasons are manifold such as mis-use, taking photographs, security etc. This policy was working up until last half term when a sizeable number of phones are being brought to school. The children are, in the main, doing the right thing and handing them into the Office. However it has become a daily event rather than one-off unavoidable instances and is becoming an issue.

It is timely to remind all at the school that children should not be regularly bringing phones into school. Whilst we understand some children walk home alone parents need to seek a more effective sytstem, carrying a phone can make children a target. If the reason for bringing a phone is that children are walking home alone and need a phone for reassurance so they can ring an adult then it is probably in the child's interests to be picked up - especially with dark nights closing in. We want to support parents and children in staying safe but the number of phones being brought into school is increasing and it is becoming a safeguarding & security concern.

If there is an over-riding reason that your child may need to bring in a phone then please request a consent form from the Office. The Headteacher will then decide if the reason is an acceptable unavoidable one and a consent slip will be returned to the family. Phones that come into school without the agreement of the school will be kept in school until collected by an adult. This policy will be strictly applied from Monday.

#### **ParentPay**



The school is now operating a new online cashless payment system from the start of this half term. Money for school lunches and trips will now only be accepted through this system.

The only money that will accepted into school will be for milk, the extended services (Breakfast Club, Educare and Afterschool Club) but please note these services can be paid through your employer as tax free childcare vouchers. The companies registered to the school are Eden Red and the Computer Share Voucher scheme.

If you have any problems or have not yet set up an account then please do not hesitate to contact the school office as soon as possible.

# Fortnite and Other Online Games

We are very concerned at the impact games like Fortnite are having on the progress and work ethic of some of the children at the



school. Recent pupil progress meetings have had a similar theme in Key Stage 2 where pupils (mainly boys) are appearing in school tired, are distracted from learning by talking about the previous night's game and actually get agitated when updates are due. There is a concern that some children are becoming addicted.

# Fortnite has a minimum age rating of 12 years old. As a result, no child in this school should be playing it.

In the UK the Video Standards council rate Fortnite as PEGI 12 for frequent scenes of mild violence. It is not suitable for persons under 12 years of age. The VSC expand on the PEGI rating by stating that "Violence consists of you using whatever weapons you can find or make to fend off the monsters of the Storm and save the survivors. Damage is dealt by numbers and life bars and monsters disappear in a purple flash when defeated."

Not covered by ratings are the interactions with other players online. Although the game isn't rating for profanity, its online nature could expose younger players to offensive language from random strangers via the voice or on-screen text chat.

It's also a game where the sound is crucial (hearing footsteps of other players in particular). This means that players will wear headphones and parents can't always hear what is being said by strangers or indeed by 'friends' in school that then spills over into the next day at school.

Like any game with a fiercely competitive online mode, younger players can find that Fortnite makes them cross or angry when they lose. This is common in games like FIFA and Rocket League, but even more in Fortnite because you only have one life and then you are out the game. This competitive and online play style also means it is hard to stop a game part way through, as children will complain this will affect their standing in the game. They will always want, "just one more go" and complain that they "can't stop now" and as a result, where consoles are in bedrooms, are playing late into the night.

A survey by ChildWise revealed that Primary school children spend an average of six hours a day in front of screens (TV, games consoles and online). Also 43% have internet access in their bedrooms.

# Signs your child is becoming dependant on gaming include:

- They are talking about their game incessantly, they play for hours on end and get defensive or even angry and aggressive when made to stop.
- Their daily needs like food and sleep are being disrupted. Physical symptoms might even arise from spending too much time online such as dry or red eyes, tiredness, irritability, soreness in the fingers, back or neck or complaints of headaches.
- 3. They appear preoccupied, depressed or lonely, as some games can be quite isolating.

As mentioned above the first sign is becoming increasingly apparent with some children in school, particularly, but not exclusively, in Upper Key Stage 2. Class teachers have been asked to bring this to the attention of relevant parents at the Parents' Meetings later this month.

The message from school is clear: Excessive online gaming is having a detrimental effect on children's learning. Please abide by minimum age guidelines and restrict time spent on games and where possible ensure consoles are not in bedrooms. At the end of the day we all want the same thing, well adjusted, happy, positive children keen to learn. We fear this is being hampered by the influence of these games on some of our pupils.

# Finally again please remember Fortnite has a minimum age of 12!!


#### **Sporting Success**

There is a app you can download for your phone or tablet and if you are having any problems registering please drop into the Office or give us a call.

So please, be aware of what your child is doing when playing video games and consider carefully the amount of time you allow them to play.

So, that brings us to the end of the November blog... the next one will be all about Christmas!!! So wrap up warm and stay safe around bonfires and fireworks if you are going to any events or celebrating at home.

#### Parents' Evenings

The Parents' Evenings this term are towards the end of

this month (Monday 25th and Tuesday

26<sup>th</sup> November). As well as asking you to review your commitments to the school (below), complete a questionnaire about online newsletters and a school meal 'takeaway' service, the meeting will focus on a detailed report of your child's progress. In addition to updating you on your child's progress, you will also receive their coloured ratings for effort, behaviour, attendance and many other things as per last year. We

will also be asking you to support your child by setting targets for you to support them at home and these will be reviewed at the next Parents' Meeting.



Finally there will be 'taster' stations for School Meals so you will be able to taste for yourself how tasty they are!

#### **School Reports**

The termly report that builds up to a completed end of year report will be shared at parents' evenings later this month. In Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 this term and next term you will only receive page 1 of the report with page 2 being added in the Summer which will include details of your child's attainment and effort in all subjects.

The 'Traffic Light', red, amber and green ratings remain are on the front page. If your child is not receiving a green rating for any aspect of their school life please support them to put this right by the time the reports are re-issued in the Spring.

The report will show the stage and half term your child was working at the start of their year (we are calling it their 'Baseline') and their current attainment level for Reading, Writing and Maths. Children from Year 2 upwards are also being assessed on their spelling and vocabulary. Your child's class teacher will help you to understand what these figures mean and will also explain how this feeds into their end of key stage target. For children in Year 2 and Year 6 who are at the end of their Key Stage and have nationally reported results at the end of the year then their outcomes in the summer will be reported on an additional page as follows:

For Maths (Y2 & Y6) & Reading (Y2 & Y6) and SPAG (Spelling, Punctuation & Grammar – Y6 only) each Y2 & Y6 child will get:

- A raw test score (how many marks they got on the test)
- A scaled score (where your child's score is compared to all taking the test nationally where a score of 100 is the average mark)

Parental Commitments (to be reviewed at meetings):

- To read with your child every day for at least 20 minutes.
- To ensure your child learns their appropriate times tables (as set by the teacher).

**Important** 

Date!

- Ensure your child completes their weekly 'Friday' homework which will consist of one piece of maths work, a reading comprehension and on occasion a 'learning challenge'.
- To make sure your child arrives at school regularly and on time and let the school know immediately of any absence.
- To ensure your child's attire follows the uniform policy and they have the correct PE Kit when needed.
- To support the school's behaviour policies and guidelines and show respect to all involved in the school community.
- To give consent for your child to make accompanied off site visits in the school locality.
- To give consent for data to be held on record about your child and their contacts and to ensure the school
  has up to date contact information.
- To allow your child's name and images of your child to be used on the school web site, newsletter and by other organisations only in school related matters.

#### **Anti-Bullying Week**

If you ever have any concerns about the safety or well-being of a child, then you can ring your concerns through to the County's 24 hour 'Safeguarding Hub' number and you

can remain anonymous if wish. you




Callers can outline their concerns and the Safeguarding Hub will give advice (consultation) and if necessary,

undertake an assessment of need.

There is now also an adult NSPCC helpline where any concerned adult can seek advice if they are concerned about a child and would like advice on whether to make a referral. The number to call is







Debbie Cook, our Educational Support Manager has trained to be a 'Domestic Violence Champion' and is a resource available to any adult who would like to confidentially share incidents with her and is a very good source of advice. Just contact the School Office to get in touch with her.

Domestic violence is on the increase and causes terrible harm to victims and the associated children.

It is everyone's responsibility to ensure it is eradicated. We are working closely with the Police and the school will learn of any incidents to support any children whose lives are affected by such an occurrence.



#### Pupil Mental Health and Wellbeing

Debbie Cook is also the school's 'Wellbeing Champion' who has the brief to ensure the mental health and wellbeing of pupils is being given a priority and that systems are in pace to ensure children are supported



when they have issues that are detrimental to their mental health. We now also have a mental health and wellbeing Governor, Kate Mahone who will monitor our provision.

Supporting pupil mental health and wellbeing is a priority of the school and there will be updates on initiatives and actions taken in future newsletters.

#### **Nursery Intakes**

Children born between 1 September 2016 and 31 December 2016 can receive their free 15 or 30 hours a week Nursery education from January 2020.

If you know of any children with birth dates between these times and would like their child to come to this school, then please ask them to get in touch with the School Office as soon as possible.

Children born between 1 January 2017 and 31 March 2017 can receive their free 15 or

30 hours a week from April 2020.



2017 and 31 August 2017 can receive their free 15 or 30 hours a week from September 2020.

Forms for applying for any of these intakes are available from the School Office or just ring and we can post them out.

Please let friends/relatives know we now have a number of spaces for Nursery in January and April and can enrol children from their 3rd birthday for 15 hours and for the full 30 hours from the term after their 3<sup>rd</sup> birthday.

#### **Beckstone's Extended Services**

Our extended services include the Breakfast Club (£4.00 from 7.30am, £3.50 from 8am); Educare (our popular afternoon child care provision for morning Nursery children - see table below) Please note that unfortunately we are unable to offer facilities for packed lunches for Nursery children.

Beckstone Xtra (again £3.50 an hour) runs from the end of the school day until 5.15pm

The prices for our extended services are extremely competitive to support families in these difficult economic times. The price per hour is only £3.50. This is very good value and an extremely competitive rate for child care.

#### **Foodbank**

As well as Harvest we are a collection point for the Foodbank all year round. The collection point is just

inside the door at the end of the Infant corridor. The Foodbank is designed to help individuals and families in crisis through the provision of emergency food



supplies. #### **Swimming & Medical Note**


A reminder to Key Stage 2 parents whose children are swimming this term and next term (& indeed Year 2 parents who will be swimming in the Summer term for the first time)

#### **Packed Lunch Policy**

The Governors agreed a new 'Food & Drink' Policy at their last meeting. The policy can be found in the policy zone of our web site.

There is an agreement that packed lunches should be healthy

and comply with Government nutritional guidance just as school meals have to. Research has shown that nationally only 1 in 100 school packed lunches do so.

There is a healthy snack swap chart at the top of the next column to give guidance on how packed lunches can be made healthier.

It is sometimes assumed that packed lunches are cheaper than school dinners. The cost for a week's school dinners is £11 however the following costs are for items from Aldi for a week's worth of packed lunches:

#### Influenza vaccination

All children in Years from Reception to Year 6 in England are eligible for seasonal flu vaccination during the autumn of 2019.



#### The nasal flu vaccine

- Almost all eligible children will be able to have the vaccine as a nasal spray (up the nose), which is a quick and painless process.
- Serious side effects are uncommon but many children can develop a runny or blocked nose, headache, some tiredness or loss of appetite that lasts for a short period.

The vaccination (Fluenz Tetra®) will be offered in school on **Thursday 21**st **November** for children where there is parental consent. Parents do not need to be present but can request to attend,

Parents of younger children may like to know that children aged 2 upwards and also in Nursery receive their free vaccination through



their GP or Pharmacies. We have placed an information booklet with regard to this in the 'Parenting Information & Guidance Zone' of our web site.

Flu vaccinations for adults are also available for adults on

request at Pharmacies or large supermarkets for an average £10 fee. It could ensure a flu free winter and many school staff have already taken up this option locally.


