Swimming 2019/20

Year 5 and class 3JM will be having swimming lessons this term. Lessons begin on Monday 9th September and finish on Monday 18th November. Children in the other Year 3 & 4 classes will then go weekly on a Monday during the Spring term. The summer term will then see Year 2 swimming and Year 6 'catch up' swimming. Children will need a bag, a towel, appropriate swimwear and a hair brush or comb. Time is tight and the children

will not have time for any 'beauty' treatments before returning to school on the bus!

Again, please can all note that <u>swimming is statutory</u> and all should take part unless medical advice <u>states otherwise</u>. There is no better sport for overall health than swimming. It's great for your heart and circulation, provides natural, low-impact resistance for building muscle and as it challenges your body it will help release endorphins - your body's natural pain and stress fighters which can fight off infection and also make you feel happy.

Dear Parent/Guardian,

A statutory part of the National Curriculum for Key Stage 2 children is to be taught to swim. The Workington Primary Heads Association organise and fund lessons at the local pool at no cost to yourselves in order to provide your children with free high quality swimming tuition.

In order for your children to gain maximum benefit from these lessons we are asking you to ensure the following;

- Your child consistently attends these sessions
 - o swimming days are known in advance, at this school they are on Monday afternoons so kit **should not** be forgotten
 - o having a 'cold' is not a reason not to swim, if anything it relaxes chest muscles so helps with this condition. Your child should only not swim on **medical advice** i.e. letter from a doctor (which is very rare)
 - o veruccas are now easily 'sealed' with over the counter treatments and so are no longer a reason not to swim
- Your child has the correct swimming kit
 - o a towel
 - o an appropriate swimming costume, shorts should be for swimming and 'short' so as not to inhibit leg movements
 - a swimming cap (available from the baths or from sports shops) for long hair
- Your child does not wear jewellery stud earrings are to be removed and when newly done a swimming cap has to be worn over them (it would greatly help your child with school sport if earring piercings took place at the start of the summer holidays only)
- Your child ensures that they have their inhaler with them if they suffer from asthma

Please also note that the swimming sessions are closed sessions and *not open to spectators* for child safety reasons.

Children who swim regularly with their families we find have more confidence and have greater success in these lessons. Full details on family swimming times and additional swimming lessons and costs can be found at:

Finally please do support and encourage your children with their swimming. Swimming is a life skill, is a fun way of keeping healthy, could develop into a lifelong pastime, is useful on holidays and could save your child's life!

2018/19 Key Stage Outcomes

The school outcomes at the end of Foundation Stage, Key Stage 1

and Key Stage 2 show that every cohort of pupils made

at least good progress at each point and indeed progress was often above national levels. From below average entry into the school the children are leaving Beckstone Primary in line with or above national expected outcomes in almost all subjects. This is wonderful news and is down to the hard work of your children, school staff and your support.



The area that needs targeting for improvement is Maths at Key Stage 2. There will be an increased focus on basic arithmetical skills and times tables over the course of the year.

Full details of outcomes are on the school's website in the 'School Performance Zone'. This will be added to over the course of this term as further Government statistics are released.

Thank you for your time in developing your child's learning and please help us maintain these high standards over this year. Our reading results have shown the biggest improvement and to maintain this

please ensure you are reading with your child for at least 20 minutes daily! Reading is the key to curriculum success and spending time with your



child reading is the most valuable gift you can give them. There is further information about how you can support your child with their reading later in this newsletter.

Mobile Phone Policy

The school has a strict 'No Mobile Phone' Policy for pupils. Indeed adults should not have mobile phones out when there are children present, please be aware of this when you drop off or collect your child.

Safeguarding/Child Protection

Sharing information is in the best interests of children and their safeguarding. The school reserves the right to share and receive information from other agencies that may have had dealings with your child.



If you ever have any concerns about the safety or well-being of a child, then you can ring your concerns through to the County's 24 hour 'Safeguarding Hub' number and you can remain anonymous if you wish. Callers can outline their concerns and the Safeguarding Hub will give advice (consultation) and if necessary undertake an assessment of need.



There is now also an adult NSPCC helpline where any concerned adult can seek advice if they are concerned about a child and would like advice on whether to make a referral. The number to call is



Domestic Violence


Debbie Cook, our Educational Support Manager has trained to


Nursery Intakes

Children born between 1 September 2016 and 31 December 2016 can receive their free 15 or 30 hours a week Nursery education from January 2020.

If you know of any children with birth dates between these times and would like their child to come to this school, then please ask them to get in touch with the School Office as soon as possible.

Children born between 1 January 2017 and 31 March 2017 can receive their free 15 or 30 hours a week from April 2020.

Children born between 1 April 2017 and 31 August 2017 can receive their free 15 or 30 hours a week from September 2020.



Please let friends/relatives know we now have a number of spaces for Nursery in September and can enrol children from their 3rd birthday for 15 hours and for the full 30 hours from the term after their 3rd birthday.

Beckstone's Extended Services



Our extended services include the Breakfast Club (£4.00 from 7.30am, £3.50 from 8am); Educare (our popular afternoon child care provision

for morning Nursery children – see table below) Please note that unfortunately we are unable to offer facilities for

packed lunches for Nursery children.

Beckstone Xtra (again £3.50 an hour) runs from the end of the school day until 5.15pm



The prices for our extended services are extremely competitive to support families in these difficult economic times. The price per hour is only £3.50. This is very good value and an extremely competitive rate for child care.

12:10—2:10 p.m. = 2 Vouchers

12:10-3:10 p.m. = 3 Vouchers

A charge of £3.10 will be required to cover the cost of a school dinner and midday care from 11.50amto 12.10pm.

*Vouchers cannot be split, for example if you collect your child at 1:45 p.m. you will be charged 2 vouchers, likewise if you collect your child at 2:30p.m. you will be charged 3 vouchers regardless.

Milk is vital for growing children as it strengthens bones and teeth. Children in Reception and Nursery are entitled to free milk as are children who are eligible for free school meals and clothing vouchers (not the universal free meal for all FS & KS1 children).


High Harrington Community Centre

Indeed, please note no children should have Facebook accounts under the age of 13 and applications to join the group will be refused/accounts will be deleted.

QR Codes

QR stands for 'quick response'. Codes, if you don't know, are

those funny black and white boxes you see in newspapers and magazines such as the image alongside. These are placed within this newsletter at relevant points to give you quick access to websites mentioned. All you have to do is install a free QR code reader to your phone/tablet, just

Breakfast Club Sandwiches

On the last Friday of each month the Breakfast Club serve bacon or sausage sandwiches at a cost of 50p per child or

£1.50 per adult. Parents can purchase a buttie as they drop their children off and can eat in or take away. The take-away option is also available to any parents even if their child is not in the Breakfast Club. The next Breakfast Club sandwich day is on Friday 27th September

Lost Property

The Lost property Box regular was filled to the top last year and in the last half term of last year it was emptied 3 (!!) times. We



cannot stress enough how important it is to label all your child's clothing and then it can be returned to them. Your children also need to take responsibility for going home from school with all the clothes they came in!



Times Tables Rock Stars

Your child should also have access to 'Times Table Rock Stars' and should know their log in details. They are able to make their own 'Rock Star Avatar' and every time they get a times table answer right (appropriate to their age) they will make money to buy things for their Rock Star. This is also available as an app from the Play Store of the App store, the children



then just need to log in with their normal school user name and password. We hope good use is made of it. Times Table testing is going to become a national statutory test for Year 4 children

from next year so this could prove to be a very worthwhile activity.



Software to help and encourage all children to learn their times tables is 'Times Table Rockstars'. Children from Year 1 upwards have their own 'Rock Avatar' and can earn points for their avatar and to work towards a series of certificates and badges that are awarded in assembly.

Term Time Holidays and the Law

The Government's policy of not allowing families to take holidays in term time and those that do being liable to prosecution and a fine is still in operation. We would like to ensure

all families are aware of this law.

The Headteacher is not allowed to authorise absence and indeed any holiday absences in term time will be counted as 'unauthorised' (which equates to a truancy mark) and may be subject to a fixed penalty notice/fine.

Parents need to fill in a leave of absence form if their child is going to be missing from school (this is of vital importance as the school immediately chases up any unknown absences on the day itself and if the child's whereabouts is not known then the Police are notified - this is school policy). Parents can apply for 'exceptional circumstances' on this form if they so wish. It is imperative that school knows where your child is for safety reasons.

Term Time Holidays & Tests

Unfortunately term time holidays have been taken at test times again this year 3. We are asking all of you to ensure this never happens again.

There is active discouragement of taking holidays in term time as it disrupts a child's learning. Taking time off at the statutory testing time needs to be avoided completely.

The key dates next year are:

Week beginning 11th May 2020 - Y2 & Y6 SAT tests Week beginning - 8th May 2020 - Phonics Screening 3 Weeks beginning 8th June - Year 4 Times Table Tests

Walk to School - Feet First

We aim to improve the health and fitness of our youngsters and reduce congestion and the hazard of traffic outside school. We hope that our children will enjoy taking part in Feet First as well as picking up road safety skills and that they will be encouraged to think about the environmental and health benefits of walking, cycling or scooting to school. 



Punctuality & Start of the Day

Please ensure that your child arrives on time to school every day – this is a statutory responsibility for all parents.



Doors open at 8.50am and everyone should be <u>in class</u> <u>by 9am.</u> No child should be unaccompanied on the <u>school yards prior to the doors opening</u>. If work means you have to drop off your child early then please use the Breakfast Club. Latecomers <u>must report to the school office</u> and dependent on age will either be escorted from there to class or will go by themselves. <u>Parents are not to escort children to classes after this time</u>.


Please do not open outside doors for children or parents after the 9am bell rings. Also please could parents with children in Nursery and the main school not use Nursery's internal doors but go round the outside instead to drop off their main school child(ren). It is important these procedures are followed to avoid children being missed from the register or from not ordering their lunch.

In addition to encourage independence we ask that Key Stage 2 and Year 2 children come to class <u>on their own</u> and that Year 1 parents try to ensure their children can access their classes unescorted as soon as they are able - try and say goodbye at the door! If your child is late on a number of occasions and no reasons are given you will be called in for a meeting. It is a statutory responsibility for parents to ensure their child arrives at school <u>ON</u> <u>TIME.</u>

It is very important for the smooth running of the end of the day that all Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 parents remember to collect their children from the following area zones. Please do not wait at the steps or collect children as they make their way to the pick-up point. Your co-operation in this matter is expected and appreciated.

Contacting Police when a Child is Missing




To ensure the safety of your child the school has a policy whereby' after not receiving advanced notification of an absence and then not being able to contact the family, the child will be

reported as missing to the Police. This procedure is aimed at ensuring that a situation where the family think the child is at school and the school thinks the child is with the family does not arise as this would then result in a child being missing until mid-afternoon! Failure to notify the school has only happened rarely but causes unnecessary upset when it does. To avoid police involvement please could all families ensure the school knows the whereabouts of your child in term times by ringing school on the day of absence or completing a leave of absence form in advance. There are leave of absence forms available from the School Office.

School Glossary

For new parents the following are terms you may see in this or other newsletters with their explanations!



to a 'free' 15 hours a week Nursery place starting from the term after their 3rd birthday. Depending on when a child is born they could spend up to 5 terms in the Nursery. Children are able to access our Educare service immediately on or after their 3rd birthday.

Educare - This is a service which is offered by the school for parents of children in the Nursery. Educare provides further Nursery provision up to the full school day. This can be purchased or accessed through the new additional FREE scheme set up by the Government. Parents need a registration code for this (there is a £3.0 charge however for lunch and care over this time). Further details are available from the School Office. Alternatively Educare is also available at a very competitive cost of £5.00 for the first hour of the afternoon (including lunch) and £3.50 per hour thereafter which is £12.00 for the full afternoon session from 11.50am to 3.10pm Child care vouchers from employers are also welcomed.

Reception – This is the school year after Nursery and before Year 1, the year in which a child has their 5th birthday.

Foundation Stage – This is the first phase in a child's educational career and comprises of the Nursery and Reception years. The phase ends with an assessment on your child's attainment over a number of early learning strands which are reported in the end of Reception report.

Key Stage 1 (KS1) - This is school Years 1 & 2. There is a nationally standardised test in phonics at the end of Year 1 (repeated in Year 2 if a child doesn't pass first time) and nationally standardised and locally moderated learning outcomes at the end of Year 2.

Year 1 Phonics Screening Check – This is a specific check on the progress of children in Year 1 in learning how to read. It is called the Year 1 Phonics Screening Check. The check is a list of 40 words that children read one-to-one with the teacher. Some of the words are real words that are likely to be known to the children. Some of the words are non-words which are aimed at helping test whether children are using only their knowledge of letter sounds to build up what the word says (and not other clues). Support for phonics and further information is available in the parent information zone of our web site.

Key Stage 2 (KS2) - This is school Years 3, 4, 5 & 6. There are ongoing summative assessments throughout these years and at the end of every year. At the end of year 6 the children are nationally tested (known as the SATs);

- in English there will be a national test in reading plus spelling, grammar and with writing being teacher assessed.
- In Maths (3 papers, one on arithmetic and 2 on mathematical reasoning) and on occasion

Science (which is a national sample test)

SATs These take place at the end of Year 2 and Year 6. Results will be reported in the form of raw scores which is the sum of the marks awarded in the test and scaled scores where national data is analysed and the average raw score is awarded '100' which becomes the national average. Other raw scores are then scaled to give a number above or below this to compare outcomes with national averages. In addition the end of year report in these years will show whether or not your child has achieved the nationally expected standard i.e. the outcome as pre-determined by the Government for a 7 year or an 11 year old child, There is a lot of information about assessments and samples of end of year tests in the Revision zone of the web site. You will need to use

the username: xxxx and the password xxxx. Across the school your child will be assessed formatively i.e. as they go along to pinpoint future progress needs. Their assessment levels and progress will be communicated to you each term through the report and parents' meetings.



Homework

The school's Homework Policy can be read in full on our web site in the Policies section or is available in our carousel of policies in the school entrance.

The following are 2 sections that explain some key facets of homework set at the school:

Our routines

All classes give out weekly homework on a Friday. If it is a piece that needs handing in, it is expected to be returned by the following Wednesday.

The work should always have been explained and discussed in class before coming home; it maybe a continuation of classwork, or a maths game already familiar to your child.

It is our intention, and good practice, not to send work home that the child cannot already do i.e. parents are not expected to teach new skills.

There should be a clear explanation/reminder from the teacher of what is expected.

Each child has a homework book or folder and the majority of tasks are kept in there. Work that needs marking (and is not feeding into other classwork) will be returned to the folder. This should happen each week.

The tasks set will not always need to be handed in; there are other ways in which teachers will respond or give feedback, for example, sharing results in class discussion, putting work on to a display or transferring work into class books.

Our current expectations

Nursery

Parents are encouraged to read a variety of books to their children and to change their reading books daily. They are also encouraged to use everyday situations for counting and communication with their children.

Parents are regularly given information about the work being covered and offered ideas about how to develop them at home. Parents are also given skills based targets on reports and provided with information on how to help prepare their child for full time school.

Reception

Reading books and tricky words are taken home daily and letters and sounds are regularly sent home for children to practise. Parents are given skills based targets and are encouraged to learn rhymes and play counting games with their children.

KS1


Reading books and Reading Records should be taken home daily. Children who read five times a week are rewarded by being entered into our Strive for Five Raffle. Weekly Friday homework will consist of one piece of basic skills maths practice and a reading comprehension. Learning Challenge homework may be given over longer holidays. Y2 children may work on specific spellings in order to prepare for SATs.

KS2

Reading books and Reading Records should be taken home daily. Accelerated Reader is used by the children in Years 3 & 4 to ensure their comprehension is secure. Weekly Friday homework will consist of one piece of maths – focusing on calculation or times tables and a reading comprehension. Learning Challenge homework may be given over longer holidays. As children prepare for SATs in KS2, homework will focus on preparing children for the demands of these tests and the format of questions.

We expect children to maintain the same standards for presentation of homework as we set in school i.e. to use their best handwriting and a sharp pencil or blue pen.

One constant homework is to read (or be read to) for at least 20 minutes a day. We would urge every parent to ensure this happens. As explained above we need parents to check the understanding of the text they have read by asking pertinent questions



Reading together – sharing books and stories should be an enjoyable experience for you both. Choose a time that is suitable for both parent and child and choose books that appeal to the child.

- Praise and encouragement are the most important words to remember. Make praise specific where possible.
- Talking about books, authors, pictures, stories and characters is every bit as important as 'de-coding'. Take time to introduce the book before reading and ask questions about it afterwards e.g. 'How do you think Lucy felt when.....?'
- The initial (first) letter sound of a word is often a good clue to an unfamiliar word. Take care when asking children to sound out the letters in a word as they may not be successful.
- Encourage children to use the meaning of what they have read to guess an unknown word.
- When your child gets stuck get them to read from the beginning of the sentence again to have another try or skip the word, go to the end of the sentence and come back for another try.
- Have regular checks for understanding.
- Try to avoid too many interruptions. If the child says a different word to the printed word but it still makes sense then let them carry on and come back to it at the end of the page or paragraph.
- If the child is making too many errors they may need a different book. As a rough guide, if the child is making about 1 error in every 10 words then the book is probably too hard.
- Read to the child even when they can read for themselves, they benefit from hearing stories well-read and talking about them.
- Try reading alternate pages to add interest and to pick up the pace.
- Make it easy for children to practise reading take them to the library, buy them books of their own, swap comics and magazines with friends and look at the printed word all around e.g. posters on car journeys.
- Let them see you reading sometimes...& enjoying it!

There is also a lot of information to help your child with reading in the 'Help Your Child to Read' zone on our web site.



Finally there is a cut off slip at the bottom of the last page and this page which can be used as a prompt sheet with your child to help develop their comprehension of what they have read (there are also some quick times tables you can help your children learn

Questions to ask your child when reading at home:

- Where does the story take place?
- When did the story take place?
- What did the character look like?
- Can you describe where the character(s) live?
- What has happened in the story/chapter?
- Can you read the part of the story that tells me....?
- Where did you find the information about...?



off by heart as a starter).. By the time your child completes their Primary education it is the comprehension of what they have read rather than their reading skills that are tested. Indeed children in Years 3 & 4 will be using 'Accelerated Reading' this year to give them a mid-school reading boost. It is designed to boost comprehension skills.

Jewellery

The only jewellery items allowed in school are watches and stud ear-rings which have to be removed for PE/Sport. If your child cannot remove their ear-rings as they have been recently pierced then please provide plasters to cover them up. There have been many instances of injury nationally from wearing jewellery whilst undertaking sporting activity.

Loom bands can be brought in to weave at play and lunchtimes but can only be worn on non-uniform days.

After School Clubs

Information about learning clubs weill be released soon. Please be aware there will be a charge of £10 per term for may of these clubs. Details will be in the letters.

Uniform

The uniform for Beckstone Primary is as follows:

Fruit


Fruit is available free to all children in Foundation and Key Stage 1 during class time (they can bring their own fruit to eat if you wish as an alternative). It is






All children in from Reception to year 6 in England are eligible for seasonal flu


vaccination during the autumn of 2019. It is a nasal spray vaccination and will not only help protect the children from getting flu but it also stops them spreading the



disease to their family, carers and the wider population. As flu viruses change each year last year's immunisation for those that had it will not be effective. The vaccination (Fluenz Tetra®) will be offered in school on **Thursday 20th November** and parents do not need to be present but can request to attend. The vaccination is free and is a quick and simple spray up the nose. Further details should be issued soon by the NHS. The only children who will be excluded are those where there is contra-indicated medical advice and there are very few this will apply to across the country. Parents of younger children may like to know that children aged 2 upwards and also in Nursery can receive their free vaccination through their GP or Pharmacies.

Flu vaccinations for adults are also available for adults on request at Pharmacies or large supermarkets for an average £10 fee. It could ensure a flu free winter and school staff will have this option later this term when a pharmacist visits the site specifically for them.



Birthday Cakes in School

Please can all families note that whilst it is a lovely idea to share your child's birthday cake at school with their friends, for health and safety reasons we are afraid we cannot let you do so. 


